CRITERION I – CURRICULAR ASPECTS

1.1 – Curriculum Planning and Implementation

1.1.1 – Institution has the mechanism for well planned curriculum delivery and documentation. Explain in 500 words

Academic calendar is prepared by IQAC every year based on the timeframe provided by the university. Monthly planner is also prepared with all the activities to be performed during the month. The college frames Timetable for all UG and PG courses based upon the papers (subjects) allotted including hours for Library, Digital Library, Seminar, Swayam, Mentor, tutorial, booster and Remedial hours. Allotment of papers (subjects) to the Teachers done by respective Head of the Department. Lesson Plan for each papers (subjects) is scheduled before the start of each semester by the respective teachers as per the hours allotted. The teachers complete the papers (subjects) curriculum

based upon the syllabus and scheme provided by Bharathiar University. The faculty completes the syllabus within the schedule planned in the academic calendar. Chalk and talk method, PPT classes using LCD projector are followed. Teachers also provide class notes and other related study materials, prescribed as reference by the university. Online quiz using the app Kahoot is used. The assignments and seminars are given in Google Classroom and the students are asked to upload the assignments and seminars through Google Classroom for which marks are assigned. Seminars from the syllabus are given to PG students as microteaching. Animated videos are shown to understand the concept easily. The Library has updated Textbooks of each discipline and also other resources such as e-books, e-journals and journal copies of respective discipline. The college has registered under N- List, NPTEL and Delnet, e-resources for student access for the updated knowledge of current innovations and research findings.

Teachers document the records of all the classes, attendance in their respective log books and the same is monitored by the Academic Monitoring Committee (AMC). The departments conduct guest lecturers to widen knowledge in the respective fields and Industrial Visits, MoU with Industries and field trips are also arranged to bridge the gap between academics and industry. Two internal Examinations and one model examinations are conducted each semester and the results of the same are analyzed to assess the students and accordingly remedial, booster classes are provided. After university examinations, Result analysis of all the departments are prepared and future action if any for further improvement is followed. Feedback from the students on teachers are received at the end of each semester and analyzed by the IQAC for any remedial (future) action.

The college library is available from 9.00 am to 5.00 pm on all working days. The students are permitted inside the library only with their identity cards. The books are indexed using OPAC system. The under graduate students are allowed to borrow two books and the post graduate students and research scholars are allowed to borrow four books at a time. The journal collection and their back volumes are easily available. The magazines and newspaper are located at strategic points to enable easy access of the same. The books are secured using bar codes for issue and return .Through inflibnet online journals are available for the users. The library advisory committee functions with the Principal as its chairman and Librarian as the Coordinator. It gives guidelines and suggestions for the improvement of infrastructure and purchase of books, Reference books and journals. Proposal and the budget are prepared by the librarian. The committee meets at regular intervals to review the maintenance and utilization of the infrastructure facilities. The college has well established system procedure for maintenance and utilization of available supporting facilities .The college has adequate number of lab facilities with all the required chemicals ,Glass wares and equipments which are maintained and serviced properly .All the stakeholders have equal opportunity to use those facilities as per the policies of the institution. All the fixed equipments are regularly upgraded. The maintenance of infrastructure facilities are carried out with the support of the Head of the department, Faculty in charge, Lab assistant ,Lab programmer and Lab attender. Teaching aids: Teaching aids such as Laptops, LCD projectors, Desktops, Printers WiFi Etc are maintained by the system administrator and a periodic audit is conducted to keep the devices in appropriate condition Garden: Garden is maintained by the Gardner. Regular pruning and Watering of potted plants in the garden are done by the Gardener. Transportation system: The college buses are available from Coimbatore and Palakkad districts for the students. The members of Board of Management are always available to guide the overall development of the institution. The meetings are conducted regularly by the concerned head of the departments with the faculty members to disseminate the responsibilities. The head of the

department allots the workload in discussion with the respective faculty based on their area of specialisation. Curriculum Development	The College is affiliated to Bharathiar University which frames the curriculum and syllabi for the affiliated colleges. The curriculum development cell analyze the syllabus with the external resource persons including industrial representative and suggest the changes to the Board of Studies in the University. Online Swayam courses were introduced for the all undergraduate students. Job Oriented Courses were conducted for students like Tally ERP 9, J2EE, Android and communication English to bridge the gap between the academic and industry.
Teaching and Learning	Adopted experiential learning through group discussion, field based assignment, industry immersion, industrial visit etc., Increased usage of ICT in the area of teaching methods. Remedial classes for slow learners and Booster classes for advanced learners were conducted regularly. Each Faculty is assigned a set of students for whom they act as Tutor/Mentor. Faculty

feedback analysis and follow up actions are carried out semester wise.

Examination and Evaluation

Continuous Internal Assessment is conducted for all the students as per the University Norms. A Standard Procedure is been set for the preparation and display of timetable, submission of question paper to the exam cell and for the conduct of Examination. Evaluation of answer scripts is done within three days and provide feedback to students on their performance. Remedial classes / test are conducted for the students based on their performance. Advanced learners are encouraged to follow more reference books and journals to gain an insight into the topic. Discussion of answer keys in the classroom is done. Assignments and Seminars on current topics or relevant topics to the respective subject are conducted.

Research and Development

The Research Committee is formed with one representative faculty from each discipline (Computer Science, Social Science and Life Science) which is headed by the Principal. The Research and development cell of the College disseminates information on conferences, funding assistance and encourages the faculty in their research publications. This Committee meets at regular intervals to plan and monitor the activities of the cell. It monitors the database of faculty and scholars presentations and publications and organizes FDPs and workshops to upgrade their research skills. Research ethics is formulated and circulated among all concerned faculty members. Minor Projects are being taken up by Faculty members and Students which is funded by the management. Faculty members are being encouraged to register for Ph.D. The college provides financial assistance for publication in journals and paper presentations in seminars and conferences

Library, ICT and Physical Infrastructure / Instrumentation

To increase the usage of library and to motivate the faculty and students the following activities are initiated. Best Library User award was initiated for maximum utilization of library resources. Enhancing the annual budget for library resources. Awareness programme for students and faculty on the usage of library was conducted. The

The admission process springs during the month of March/April and advertisements are published in local, regional, national dailies and broadcasted in local channels / radios. Students are admitted based on the UGC reservation policy. The college ensures the rules, regulations and eligibility criteria prescribed by the Bharathiar University. Information regarding admission process, programmes offered etc., are published in Newspaper, websites and brochures. A Prospectus that highlights the details of various programmes offered by the college is prepared every year prior to the commencement of admissions.
